1. World Cerebral Palsy Day - 6 October (Oct. 6, 2023)

World Cerebral Palsy Day is observed every year on 6 October.

An Overview of the News

- The day aims to promote greater inclusion and understanding of cerebral palsy.
- The theme of World Cerebral Palsy Day 2023 is "Stronger Together".
- Emphasizes unity, cooperation, and mutual support within the cerebral palsy community.

Festivals in India:

- It is celebrated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPWD) under the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India.
- The focus has been on creating awareness about cerebral palsy through various programs nationwide.

What is Cerebral Palsy (CP):

- It is a condition that affects muscle control, body balance, and brain development.
- It is classified as a disability because of its impact on mental and physical abilities.
- More than 7 million people are affected globally each year.

2. World Teachers Day - 5 October (Oct. 5, 2023)

World Teachers' Day is celebrated globally on 5 October.

An Overview of the News

- World Teachers' Day is a day to honor and recognize the important role of teachers in transforming education and society. It calls for support and appreciation for teachers around the world.
- World Teachers' Day is organized by UNESCO in collaboration with the International Labor Organization (ILO), United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and Education International (EI).
- In India, Teacher's Day is celebrated on 5 September.

Theme 2023:

- The theme of World Teachers' Day 2023 is **"The teachers we need for the education we want: The global imperative to reverse the teacher shortage"**

- UNESCO emphasizes the importance of addressing the decline in the number of teachers worldwide.

Background of World Teachers Day:

- In 1994, UNESCO's General Assembly passed a resolution designating October 5 as World Teachers' Day.
- On October 5, 1966, UNESCO held a special conference in Paris, where the UNESCO/ILO Recommendation Relating to the Status of Teachers was adopted, which established rights and responsibilities for teachers and established international standards for education. Went.

UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization):

- Establishment - 16 November 1945
- Membership - 195 member countries and 8 associate members
- Areas of focus - UNESCO works in the fields of education, science, culture, communication and information to achieve its mission.
- Headquarters - Paris, France
- Director General - Audrey Azoulay

3. National Dolphin Day - 5 October (Oct. 5, 2023)

National Dolphin Day is celebrated every year on 5 October.

An Overview of the News

- National Dolphin Day aims to raise awareness for dolphin conservation.
- Dolphins are valuable ecological indicators of a healthy aquatic ecosystem, contributing to the overall health of the Earth.

History of National Dolphin Day

- On 5 October 2009, Prime Minister Manmohan Singh declared the Ganges dolphin as the 'National Aquatic Animal' during the inaugural meeting of the National Ganga River Basin Authority.
- Union Environment Minister Bhupendra Yadav announced the celebration of National Dolphin Day on March 25, 2022, during the 67th meeting of the Standing Committee of the National Wildlife Board.
- The second National Dolphin Day was observed on October 5, 2023.

About Ganga Dolphin:

- Scientific Name: **Platanista gangetica.**

- The Ganges dolphin is one of the five main species of river dolphins worldwide.
- They are found mainly in the Indian subcontinent, especially in river systems such as the Ganges-Brahmaputra-Indus-Meghna and Karnaphuli-Sangu.
- According to the Ganges Dolphin Conservation Action Plan 2010-2020, adult male dolphins are approximately 2 to 2.2 meters in length, while females are approximately 2.4 to 2.6 meters in length.
- Adult Ganges dolphins usually weigh between 70 and 90 kg.
- They are found in various Indian states including Assam, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Jharkhand and West Bengal.
- The Ganges dolphin is classified as 'Endangered' on the Red List of the International Union for Conservation of Nature.

Reasons for decreasing dolphin population:

- Dams built on rivers obstruct the water flow.
- Pollution, including industrial and plastic waste.
- fishing net.
- Accumulation of silt in rivers.
- The historical hunt for oil.

Government Conservation Efforts:

- The Indian Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 included the Ganges dolphin in its First Schedule in 1986, with the aim of promoting their conservation and establishing wildlife sanctuaries.
- Vikramshila Ganga Dolphin Sanctuary in Bihar was established under this Act.
- The government prepared the 'Ganga Dolphin Conservation Action Plan 2010-2020' to assess the threats to the Ganges dolphin, including the impacts of river traffic and irrigation canals on their population.

4. World Nature Day - 3 October (Oct. 4, 2023)

World Nature Day is celebrated every year on 3 October.

An Overview of the News

- World Nature Day was established by the **World Nature Organization (WNO) on 3 October 2010.**
- The 2023 theme of World Nature Day is '**Forests and Livelihoods: Sustaining People and Planet**'.

Importance of World Nature Day

- It aims **to combat ignorance of climate change and emphasize its urgency.**
- Encourages recycling, reducing plastic use and adopting a sustainable lifestyle.
- Inspires responsibility towards the environment and collective action to protect it.

Celebration of World Nature Day 2023

- **Tree planting:** Communities plant trees to contribute to reforestation efforts.
- **Awareness campaigns:** Organizations organize seminars and workshops to educate people about climate change.
- **Rallies and demonstrations:** Peaceful rallies take place around the world to draw attention to environmental concerns.
- **Social media engagement:** The use of hashtags such as #WorldNatureDay allows participation to be shared globally.

Key facts about World Nature Day 2023

- Carbon dioxide levels: Atmospheric CO2 concentration is 408 ppm, the highest in 3 million years.
- Temperatures recorded: 2016 was the hottest year, with the average temperature 1.78°F above mid-20th century levels.
- Role of deforestation: Human-induced deforestation contributes 11% of global carbon emissions.
- Amazon Rainforest: Stores 50% of the region's carbon, highlighting its importance for conservation.
- Climate Vulnerability: About 11% of the world's population (800 million people) is vulnerable to the adverse impacts of climate change.
- Coastal Ecosystems: Coastal ecosystems store ten times more carbon than tropical forests.
- Impact of Deforestation: Approximately 1 million hectares of forests have been lost due to deforestation, causing habitat loss and carbon emissions.

5. World Heart Day - 29 September (Sept. 29, 2023)

World Heart Day is celebrated every year on 29 September.

An Overview of the News

- The primary objective of World Heart Day is **to raise awareness about cardiovascular diseases (CVD), their prevention and global impacts.**
- This day was started by the **World Heart Federation (WHF).**

- The WHF is a non-governmental organization founded in **1972 in Geneva, Switzerland.**

2023 themes and key messages:

- The theme of World Heart Day in 2023 is "**Use Heart, Know Heart**".
- This highlights the importance of preventing CVD by addressing risk factors such as tobacco use, unhealthy diet and physical inactivity.
- WHF emphasizes advocacy for a healthy heart lifestyle as a fundamental human right.

Global impact and statistics:

- According to the World Health Organization, CVD is a major global health concern, causing 17.9 million deaths annually.
- World Heart Day serves as a global event to raise awareness about the dangers of cardiovascular disease and the vital importance of prevention.

6. World Tourism Day - 27 September (Sept. 27, 2023)

World Tourism Day is celebrated every year on 27 September to raise global awareness about the important role of tourism in the world economy.

An Overview of the News

- According to the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO), the economic impact of tourism is equal to or even greater than that of industries such as oil exports.
- The theme of World Tourism Day in 2023 is "Tourism and Green Investment".
- To mark World Tourism Day 2023, UNWTO is hosting a two-day conference in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia.

Background of World Tourism Day:

- The decision to celebrate 27 September as World Tourism Day was made during the third session of the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) General Assembly in Torremolinos, Spain in September 1979.
- World Tourism Day was celebrated for the first time in 1980.

UNWTO:

- UNWTO is a specialized agency of the United Nations established in 1975.
- Its primary mission is to promote responsible, sustainable and universally accessible tourism encompassing various forms of tourism, including marine, coastal and inland water tourism.
- UNWTO consists of 159 member countries and 6 associate members.

- The headquarters of the organization is located in Madrid, Spain.
- The Secretary-General of UNWTO is Zurab Pololikashvili, a citizen of Georgia.

7. International Sign Language Day - 23 September (Sept. 23, 2023)

International Sign Language Day is designated by the United Nations General Assembly and is celebrated on 23 September each year.

An Overview of the News

- The purpose of this day is **to raise awareness about the important role of sign language in maintaining the human rights of deaf persons.**
- It provides an opportunity to promote and preserve the linguistic and cultural heritage of the Deaf community.

The theme of International Sign Language Day 2023:

- The theme for 2023 is **“A World Where Deaf People Everywhere Can Sign Anywhere!”**
- This theme underlines the unifying power of sign languages and emphasizes their importance to Deaf communities, governments, and civil society organizations.

History of International Sign Language Day

- International Sign Language Day was **established in 2018 by the World Federation of the Deaf (WFD)**, an organization dedicated to advocating for the human rights of the approximately 70 million deaf people worldwide.
- The WFD consists of **135 national member federations**, and they initiated the concept of this special day.
- The day was introduced as a part of a broader celebration known as the International Week of the Deaf.

8. World Rhino Day - 22 September (Sept. 22, 2023)

World Rhino Day is celebrated every year on 22 September.

An Overview of the News

- It is a global initiative whose primary goal is **to raise awareness of the significant challenges facing the rhinoceros species around the world.**
- The day also serves as a platform to advocate for the protection and conservation of rhinos.
- World Rhino Day highlights the serious threats and hardships that rhinoceros species face in their natural habitats.

History of World Rhino Day

- The rhinoceros crisis **began in Africa in the 1990s** due to the large-scale poaching of rhinoceros horns.
- By 2010, the crisis became widespread, with **only 30,000 rhinos left globally**.
- In **2010, the World Wildlife Fund - South Africa** launched World Rhino Day to address the growing threat of rhinos.
- **Lisa Jane Campbell's Vision (2011):** Lisa Jane Campbell's efforts to protect all five rhinoceros species led to the establishment of World Rhino Day.
- The purpose of dedicating a day to the rhinoceros is to promote awareness about the conservation of its five distinct species.

The five species of rhinoceros include:

1. Javan Rhino
2. Sumatran Rhino
3. Black Rhino
4. Greater One Horned Rhinoceros
5. White Rhino

Importance of World Rhino Day:

- Raises awareness of the dire situation of rhinos.
- Amplifies the voices of organizations, enthusiasts, and individuals.
- Discusses and promotes conservation projects.
- Encourages active participation in rhino conservation efforts.
- Emphasis was placed on adopting sustainable practices for the survival of rhinos.
- The impact of individual choices on the welfare of rhinos is highlighted.

9. International Day of Peace - 21 September (Sept. 21, 2023)

The International Day of Peace (IDP) is observed every year on 21 September.

An Overview of the News

- The IDP was established by the United Nations (UN) to emphasize the global commitment to peace, non-violence, and conflict resolution.

The theme for 2023:

- The theme of the 2023 IDP is "**Action for Peace: Our Ambition for the #GlobalGoals**".
- This theme emphasizes both individual and collective responsibilities in promoting peace.
- To ensure the success of these goals, it calls for the participation of various actors, including the world's 1.2 billion youth.

The topic focuses on three key areas:

- Fighting inequality
- Taking action on climate change
- Promote and protect human rights

History of International Peace Day:-

- **United Nations Resolution 36/67 (1981):** The International Day of Peace began with the adoption of United Nations Resolution 36/67 on September 30, 1981.
- **Selection of the third Tuesday of September:** Following a United Nations resolution, it was decided that the International Day of Peace would be celebrated annually on the third Tuesday of September.
- **Inaugural Ceremony (1982):** The first official observance of the International Day of Peace took place on 21 September 1982.
- **Official designation of September 21 (2001):** An important development in the history of this day occurred in 2001 when September 21 was officially established as the International Day of Peace.

10. International Red Panda Day - 16 September (third Saturday of September) (Sept. 19, 2023)

International Red Panda Day (IRPD) is celebrated across the world on the third Saturday of September each year.

An Overview of the News

- International Red Panda Day aims to raise awareness of the importance of red panda conservation and encourage people to take action to protect them.
- IRPD 2022 took place on September 17, 2022, while IRPD 2024 will be celebrated on September 21, 2024.
- Red pandas are found mainly in the mountainous forests of Nepal, India, Bhutan, China, and Myanmar.
- Red Panda Network (RPN) was founded in 2007 and was founded by Brian Williams.
- RPN is headquartered in Oregon, United States of America (USA).
