# 1. FIA cancels the Chinese Grand Prix Formula One 2023 due to covid restriction imposed in China ( Dec. 2, 2022 )

FIA cancels the Chinese Grand Prix Formula One 2023

The FIA (Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile) or Federation of International Automobiles which organizes the <u>Formula One</u> or F1 motor racing championship has cancelled the **Chinese Grand Prix 2023** due to the covid related restriction imposed in the country.

The race was scheduled to be held in **Shanghai** on 16 April 2023. Last time a F1 race was held in China was in 2019.

Thousands of people across the cities in China have been demonstrating against the governments strict zero covid policy. Many cities in China are under lockdown as record daily virus cases are being reported across China. The new season of the F1 will start from **Bahrain** on 5 March 2023. The 2023 season will feature a record 24 **races** which included the Chinese race also.

# 2. Max Verstappen wins Abu Dhabi F1 Grand Prix for his team Red Bull ( Nov. 20, 2022 )

Max Verstappen wins Abu Dhabi F1 Grand Prix

Reigning Formula One (F1) world champion **Max Verstappen** of **Red Bull team** won the season ending F1 **Abu Dhabi race** held on 20 November 2022 in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. It was his record **15th title** of the 2022 season. He also ended the 2022 season as the world F1 champion. He won his **first F1 world championship** title in 2021.

The 25 year old Max Verstappen of **Holland** created a number of records in the history of F1. Some of his records are as follows;

He also holds the record for winning a maximum 15 races in a single season. He broke
the previous record of 13 race victories in a season jointly held by seven-time world
champion Michael Schumacher (2004 season) and four-time world champion
Sebastian Vettel (2013 season).

• Verstappen also set a new record for scoring the **most points** in a single season - 454. Previously, the record was held by seven-time world champion Lewis Hamilton who had amassed 413 points during his championship-winning season in 2019.

- Max Verstappen of Red Bull team was crowned the Formula one champion after winning the year end Abu Dhabi Grand Prix to beat the race leader Lewis Hamilton.
- He became the **first Dutch(Netherland) driver to win the Formula one or F1** motor car racing championship.

## 2. 20th Asian Rowing Championship

# 7. Indian team wins Bridge Championship
